



*Number Enrolled in CTE Programs as a Percent of all Juniors and Seniors in Component District High Schools






Status of Career and Technical Education (CTE) Students 2019 Placement Outcomes


Test Assessing Secondary Completion Leading to TASC For CTE Students Age 16-18 2019-2020

Alternative Education

Alternative Education Outcomes

The objective of the alternative education program is to retain students until they graduate or return to a regular school setting. Educational Gain

Under the NRS, educational gain is the primary goal for students in adult beginning/intermediate programs, adult secondary (low) programs, and in English for speakers of other languages programs. Students are counted as achieving educational gain if they exceed established reference points in their standardized test scores between enrollment and re-testing.

Special Education Enrollment and Tuition

- 6 students per teacher plus one paraprofessional (6:1:1)
- ❖ 12 students per teacher plus four paraprofessionals (12:1+1:3)
- ❖ 8 students per teacher plus 1 paraprofessional (8:1:1)
- ❖ 15 students per teacher plus 1 paraprofessional (15:1:1)
- 6 students per teacher plus 2.5 paraprofessional (6:1:2.5)


