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From our executive director: Leadership Under Fire

Dear Members,

It is August and you have submitted plans that are the most reflective of what you currently know and what you believe are in the best interests of everyone who will need to work with them.

Yet, because the information is ever evolving and that the final say over these plans is not yours, your stress is unrelenting. On top of these extensive worries, you have no certainty on how you will afford the necessary implementation costs of providing instruction safely in your schools.

To say this has been an extraordinary year doesn't seem to capture all that has happened to date and 2020 is only two-thirds gone. This is the year of the decennial census and a presidential election year. That makes it critical enough. We have since added a devastating pandemic and are, once again, reckoning with the systemic racism that still permeates our nation. All of you, as school leaders have important roles in every area of these current and critical events.

Several years ago, I attended a presentation titled "Leadership under Fire" by Dr. Michael McGough. He used his extensive knowledge of political and military history to share the lessons of presidents and military leaders when they had to make some of the most critical decisions of their careers. He used that information to share with us what he believed, leadership at its finest, looked like within those contexts.

Making a positive difference in the lives of children is the most noble of pursuits and while your work isn't always readily visible, if it is done well, its impact is immense. This year your leadership has been and will continue to be tested, perhaps more than ever before, and you will need to be the finest leaders you can be.

You are clearly leaders under fire. And so, I share some of Dr. McGough's words with you. And, while I can't share his historical references in this short space, I hope that they offer you some guiding tenets and some inspiration. Please know that we are also here to help in any way that we are able.

- Leadership requires both personal and professional commitment;
- Leaders with vision know that powerful organizations seldom stand alone;
- Great leaders know the chain of command, they respect it, and they lead (live) by it;
- Wise leaders never make capricious decisions; they go through a rational, thoughtful process;
- Powerful leaders believe in something bigger than themselves;
- Great leaders put the right people in the right places;
- Thoughtful leaders demonstrate grace under fire.

3) Building relationships within MCSBAa. Professional development offerings for new members


- b. Professional development for BOE Leadership
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

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July news conference describes CCCERA

During a July 13 news conference at the Victor CSD Early Learning Center, U.S. Senator Charles Schumer presented legislation he is proposing to give American K-12 schools an additional \$175 billion in federal aid to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic. The \$175 billion for K-12 schools is part of the proposed Coronavirus Child Care and Education Relief Act (CCCERA) that would inject \$430 billion nationwide. The package includes support for child care providers, college tuition, and a workforce aimed at preventing child abuse, as well as other aid for education and family health. Since the aid would be based on student population, districts in Ontario would share more than \$30 million and Monroe County school districts would share in hundreds of millions of dollars. Schools would have flexibility in how the funds are spent, as long as they support health and education. Victor School Superintendent Tim Terranova noted that the funds are needed "for school safety and to take the burden off the taxpayers."

During her news conference remarks, Executive Director Sherry Johnson (MCSBA said, in part:

"Amid the monumental tasks before our school board members and superintendents, and the myriad of uncertainties that weigh heavily on their hearts and minds, there are two certainties that they are well aware of -

One, no matter what fate awaits the plans that they are submitting this month to the state or what September will actually look like for school reopening, schools will need abundantly more resources for instruction and in order to provide for the health, safety and wellbeing of staff and students.

Two, the Governor has promised that there will be across the board budget cuts without more federal assistance."

"This proposed legislation provides direct relief for those two certainties. This is a comprehensive piece of legislation. It provides support across the spectrum of care, from day care for our babies and young children to our young adults in college. It supports our most vulnerable students as we continue to strive to address equity and access which this pandemic has so highlighted and it holds education leaders accountable for those dollars. We need this to be passed and approved sooner than later. Our district boards and superintendents have worked continuously since school buildings closed in March. They need support now."


