Alumni Spotlight

Maxine Bostick

Urban-Suburban alumna Maxine Bostick is a hardworking, resilient, social butterfly. In 2025, she will celebrate ten years since graduating from Fairport High School, a milestone that coincides with the 60th anniversary of the Urban-Suburban program. Maxine has vivid memories of her senior year during the program's 50th anniversary, a time filled with events and opportunities she says played a big role in her personal growth. She got involved and stayed involved.

Maxine will tell you it was her mom who lovingly pushed her into school engagements early on. She started the Urban-Suburban program in third grade after her school in the Rochester City School District closed. Switching schools meant stepping all the way out of her comfort zone. Maxine didn't see her family at school anymore, she was farther from home, and learning in a different community.

"I will never forget my third-grade teacher. She was welcoming and understanding, and that definitely made me feel a part of the school," said Maxine. "In elementary school, my mom kind of forced me to be part of the culture because she wanted me to enjoy the experience. So elementary was a lot of my mom signing me up for programs and making me go."

By the time Maxine was a senior, it was a different story. "There wasn't anything you could keep me and my friends from. We were at the sporting events, we were in yearbook club, we put on an Urban-Suburban forum to educate everyone for Black History Month, we were constantly talking to the administrators."

So, what changed? A lot. Maxine lost her mom unexpectedly before her junior year of high school. Maybe it was her mom's voice in her head, her best friend since fifth grade, her family, her Fairport family, her own strength, or a combination of these factors—but Maxine rose through tragedy.

"My junior and my senior year I definitely had teachers who were kind of like my parents at school," said Maxine. Then there was the sentry she considered one of the pillars of her support system. "He was just a truly amazing individual. He was really part of the reason why we became involved." Her group of friends participated in countless Urban-Suburban events and opportunities through Fairport High School. That's why getting involved is her number one piece of advice for students in the Urban-Suburban program.



"I know that we had long bus rides. I know getting involved makes our day long. Me and my friends, we were literally at school for 16 hours. There might be things back home that we think we're missing, but I think if you really truly want to enjoy the program, you have to become a part of the culture at your school," Maxine urged.

She also acknowledges the bittersweet reality of the program. "I think Urban-Suburban gave me a different

perspective on the world at a young age. I think racism is still real in our world and being someone from the city, I do experience some type of, I don't want to say discrimination, but you're judged in some type of capacity by at least one person," explained Maxine. "I think [Urban-Suburban] teaches you how to interact with different people early in life."

After high school, Maxine went to college. She started working at the ARC of Monroe and quickly fell in love with it. The ARC was one of the reasons that she changed her major and started working toward becoming a lawyer instead of a neurosurgeon. She also credits a teacher at Fairport High School who saw her as a lawyer before she even entertained the thought.

"I definitely want to do family [law], I would like to do criminal, but there's a part of me that thinks I'm going to end up helping people with disabilities as a lawyer," said Maxine.

And she plans to stay involved with Urban-Suburban. In August, Maxine spoke at Fairport's New Family Orientation for Urban-Suburban. She has a cousin who recently graduated from Fairport High School, and a nephew who just started his journey at Martha Brown Middle School.

"I try to stay involved especially because I think it's important to give back to the next generation," said Maxine. "I want to make someone else's journey just a little bit easier."
