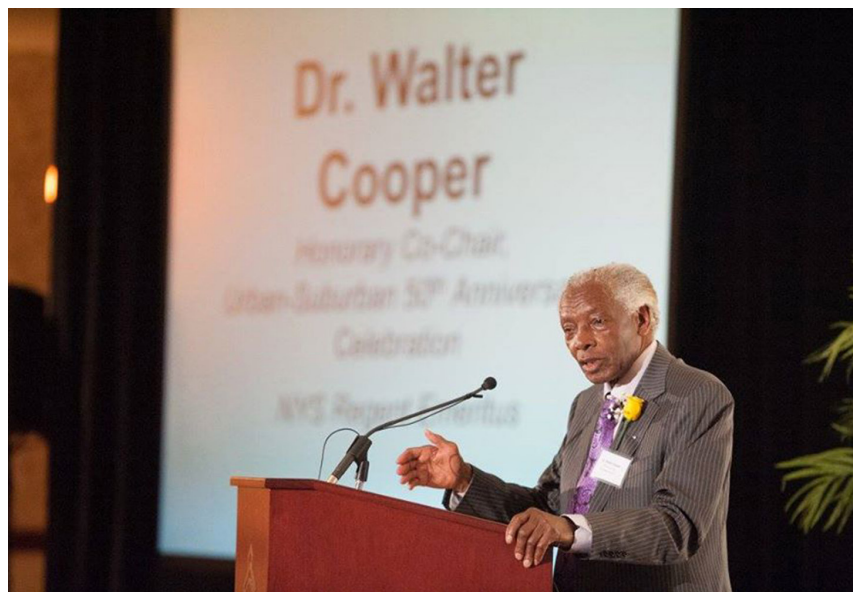

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Urban-Suburban Celebrates 50th Anniversary

On Friday, June 12th, the Urban-Suburban Program celebrated its 50th Anniversary at the Joseph A. Floreano Rochester Riverside Convention Center. The celebration included the 2015 Urban-Suburban Program graduates and their families, supporters who have made this groundbreaking program possible, as well as some of the alumni whose lives it has changed.



Dr. Walter Cooper, New York State Regent Emeritus and public education activist and Honorary Co-Chair of the celebration, was the keynote speaker, who shared personal memories of the creation of the Program prior to 1965, as well as his involvement with Dr. Walter Cooper Academy School #10 and his belief that the foundation to a successful education is parental commitment and support beginning in the preschool age.

The Urban-Suburban Program, coordinated by Monroe #1 BOCES, is the longest-running, voluntary, integrated multicultural educational program in the nation. The Program was initiated in 1965 by the West Irondequoit and Rochester City School Districts as a response to the racial imbalance that existed in the Rochester area schools during that time. After that, six additional school districts in our area followed suit, and thousands of students have benefitted from the program over the past 50 years, with 96% of graduates continuing on to higher education. Parent and family involvement has been and continues to be the cornerstone of the program.

Currently, Urban-Suburban Program participants include Brighton, Brockport, Fairport, Penfield, Pittsford, West Irondequoit, and Wheatland-Chili. This year the program welcomes five new school districts including East Rochester, East Irondequoit, Hilton, Kendall, and Spencerport.

Urban-Suburban Parents Raise \$16,000 for Program Scholarship Fund

In lieu of the traditional fundraisers supported by program parents, this year families made a \$50 pledge to the scholarship fund in celebration of 50 years of service and to support the graduating class of 2015.

As a result, parents raised \$16,000—the most ever raised since the inception of the scholarship fund in 1985. In light of this success, parents will be asked to pledge \$50 annually (or more if they choose) in support of the class of 2016.

On May 2, the Urban-Suburban Scholarship Committee awarded \$16,000 in college scholarships, ranging from \$250 to \$2,000, to 29 outstanding students. Scholarship recipients must be Urban-Suburban students in good standing, must be scheduled to graduate in the year the application was

submitted, must have at least a “C” average and must plan to attend college the following September or January. Scholarship awards are sent directly to the designated college in August of each year.

This year’s Scholarship Committee consisted of ten volunteers: eight current program parents and two district administrators. The program seeks new volunteers each year which allows high school parents an opportunity to learn about the college application and scholarship process. The committee always provides valuable feedback which allows the program to consistently improve upon the scholarship process. All scholarship recipients were recognized at the program’s 50th Anniversary Gala and their school’s award ceremonies in May and June.

Sugar is Sweet; Our Parents Are Too!

In 2012, Urban-Suburban parents began an initiative of supporting food cupboards or food shelves in the suburbs that participated in the Urban-Suburban Program. The program would ask suburban food pantries to identify a singular item they were most in need of, which made the “food drives” more effective. Since the inception of this initiative, Program parents have donated paper products to Brighton; peanut butter to Brockport, toothpaste and brushes to West Irondequoit, spaghetti sauce to Wheatland-Chili and now 373 pounds of sugar to the Penfield Ecumenical Food Shelf.

The donation helps to provide emergency food assistance to the individuals and families they serve. The Food Shelf was established in May 1997 and has served Penfield’s neediest residents. They completely rely on donations from individuals, schools, clubs, churches and businesses. They continue to grow, serving more individuals and families each year and would like to thank the parents of Urban-Suburban Program for their generosity.

Fairport Students ‘Shed a Little Light’ on the Urban-Suburban Program

“With the connections I’ve made through Fairport, I wouldn’t return to the Rochester City School District,” stated Maxine when asked by a student if she would consider returning to city schools. “I think we have the best of both worlds: living in the city and attending Fairport schools.”

Frankie is currently ranked in the top 15 wrestlers in the country at 138 pound weight class. He is the only wrestling state champion in the history of Penfield High School. His parents and family are very proud that he is a part of the Urban-Suburban Program and Penfield High School.



Carlton Ekiyor is a senior at Brockport High School and has received many accolades in athletics, academics and civic engagement.
