Webster joins Urban-Suburban Program

The Urban-Suburban Program proudly welcomes its 13th participating district: Webster Central School District (WCSD). During 2015-2016, the Program grew exponentially from seven to twelve participating districts. At the November 19 Webster Board of Education meeting, the board voted unanimously on a resolution to approve participation in the Urban-Suburban Program beginning in fall 2016. The district's goal is to welcome 25-30 students from the Rochester City School District into grades 2, 3, and 4 across the district's seven elementary schools.

WCSD approached the Urban-Suburban Interdistrict Transfer Program while spending the past 15 months researching opportunities to provide more diversity in its school community. The district's Core Beliefs include the words "Students First: Each student is invaluable," a guiding principle present in every district program. Webster CSD provides an educational environment driven by a vision that maximizes achievement for all students, enhances students' well-being, and builds dynamic partnerships with all members of the Webster School community. In the district's continued commitment to that vision and to its Core Beliefs, Webster looks forward to collaborating with the Urban-Suburban Program on this worthwhile opportunity for students.

Ranita Williams receives college scholarship from Conkey Cruisers




Congratulations, Pittsford Pride Citizenship Recognition Award Winner, Keturah Lockett!

East Irondequoit Superintendent Susan Allen Named New York State School Superintendent of the Year

The New York State Council of School Superintendents announced that East Irondequoit Central School District Superintendent Susan Allen has been named the 2016 New York State School Superintendent of the Year.

Mrs. Allen is certified as a school district administrator, a school business administrator, a reading teacher, a music teacher and an elementary, kindergarten and preschool teacher. She earned a certificate of advanced study in school business and certification in school administration from the College at Brockport, a master's degree in reading from Nazareth College, and a bachelor's degree in music with a minor in education from the College at Brockport where she graduated Magna Cum Laude. She has taught graduatelevel educational leadership courses at the College at Brockport, and has been a presenter at numerous regional, state and national conferences.

Under her leadership, East Irondequoit Central School District has received a number of awards and recognitions including designation as a School of Opportunity by the National Education Policy Council; as one of the top communities in the United States for Music Education by the National Association of Music Merchants; and as a Challenge List High School by the Washington Post.

As the New York State Superintendent of the Year, Mrs. Allen now becomes New York's candidate for national superintendent of the year, to be awarded at AASA's National Conference on Education in Phoenix, AZ, in February 2016.

The Superintendent of the Year Award was established in 1988 by the American Association of School Administrators and is co-sponsored by the ARAMARK Education, the Variable Annuity Life Insurance Company and AASA.




Fairport welcomes new Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources and Labor Relations



Rudd began his new position in September 2015.





Urban League of Rochester Annual Salute to Black Scholars Early Recognition Program

The Urban League of Rochester's 30th Annual Early Recognition Program was held on Sunday, November 8 at Nazareth College. The Early Recognition Program is a component of the Black Scholars Program where honorees must continue to meet the necessary requirements in order to be eligible, as graduating seniors, for recognition as Urban League Black Scholars. As sophomores, students must achieve an unweighted 9th grade cumulative GPA of "C+" (2.75) or better; juniors must achieve an unweighted cumulative GPA of a "B-" (2.85) or better for four semesters (9th and 10th grade) and seniors must achieve an unweighted cumulative GPA of "B" (3.00) or better for seven semesters (9th, 10th, and 11th grade and first semester of 12th grade). Only grades earned in science, English, math, history and foreign languages are computed. Congratulations, and continue to strive for academic excellence!
