

Class of 2017 Receives \$24,500 in Urban-Suburban Scholarships

The Urban-Suburban Scholarship continues to set new records! As a result of the annual pledges and proceeds from the 3-on-3 Basketball Scholarship Tournament, \$25,857 was raised—setting a new record!

On May 6, the Urban-Suburban Scholarship Committee convened and awarded \$24,500 in college scholarships to 25 students. The awards ranged from \$250 to \$4,000. Scholarship recipients must be Urban-Suburban students in good standing, scheduled to graduate in the year the application was submitted, have at least a "C" average, and plan to attend college the September or January following their high school graduation. Scholarship awards are sent directly to the designated college in August of each year.

In addition, the Monroe #1 BOCES Educational Foundation awarded two \$500 college scholarships to graduating seniors in the Urban-Suburban Program. This scholarship can be received directly by the students and used to assist with out-of-pocket college expenses, such as books. The Educational Foundation continues to designate this scholarship annually.

All scholarship recipients were recognized at the annual Urban-Suburban awards ceremony and their respective schools' awards ceremonies in May and June.

This year's Scholarship Committee consisted of nine volunteers: seven current program parents and two district representatives. The program seeks new volunteers each year, affording current high school parents of the program an opportunity to learn about the Urban-Suburban scholarship and application process. In order to be a committee member, parent volunteers must have a student in grades 9–11. It is never too early to sign-up. Urban Suburban Hosts its 7th Annual Award Ceremony

On May 15, 2017, the Urban-Suburban Program held its 7th Annual Awards Ceremony. The ceremony recognizes the academic accomplishments of our students in grades 6–12, including graduating seniors and scholarship recipients. This year, 432 students received an award.

Students received awards based on the following criteria:

Core Honors Awards: Average grade for three marking periods of 80–89% in math, science, English and

social studies/history.

Academic Achievement: Average grade for three marking periods of 90% to 94% in math, science, English

and social studies/history.

Academic Excellence: Average grade for three marking periods of 95% or more in math, science, English

and social studies/history.

Perfect Attendance: Maintained perfect attendance for first three marking periods.

Principal's Award: Recipient participates with students, faculty and staff in an effort to reduce minority

group isolation; works to the best of his/her ability to achieve academic excellence;

and demonstrates he/she is a responsible citizen.

Scholarship Awards: Be in good standing with the Program; maintain at least a "C" average; be accepted

at, or made plans to attend, an institution of high learning.

The ceremony also presented the "Slugger" Awards to honor friends of the Program for their service and commitment. The Slugger Award acknowledges someone who has given unwavering dedication and commitment to the students, parents, administrators, school faculty and staff of the Program. This year, we recognized eight individuals who have made significant contributions to the Program.

The Pre-Kindergarten Experience:

The Tale of a Suburban Parent Participating in a Cross-District Collaboration

The program essentially doubled the number of participating districts, now representing thirteen suburban districts within Monroe County. Our mission statement changed, from focusing on racial and ethnic integration to deconcentrating poverty, providing access to better educational opportunities for **ALL** city residents. Efforts also resumed in an attempt to make Urban-Suburban a true two-way program, allowing suburban students attending our participating districts to take advantage of opportunities at several city high schools and a special initiative between School 50 and West Irondequoit.

The cross-district opportunities were made possible due to a federal integration grant Rochester City School District (RCSD) received in 2014. As a part of this grant, five students from West Irondequoit entering pre-kindergarten were allowed to attend School 50. Interest in this opportunity was generated via word of mouth, and had immediate appeal to parents in that district. Not only did the two communities border one another, but it promoted a diverse educational experience, in a free, high-quality pre-kindergarten program.

Jackquelyn Woodard was one of the parents that took advantage of this opportunity. Her son Keith Jr. has had a wonderful experience as a part of this initiative. As early as October, only a month into the school year, Mrs. Woodard expressed how incredibly pleased she was with the growth that she had seen in her son in such a short period of time.

In November 2016, Mrs. Woodard wrote:

"As I reflect back on my son's last few months of school, I am beyond impressed with this initiative. I have witnessed more growth in him from September to now than I ever thought possible. Keith is excited every day when I arrive to pick him up and disappointed on Fridays when he cannot return to school the following day. Therefore, I feel the need to brag a little bit about my son's overall experience. First, Mrs. Agostinelli's class is impeccably run. The routines have been set and the kids follow them. As an educator, I understand the importance of students being able to take direction before entering kindergarten. This will definitely not be an issue for these kiddos. They understand centers and more importantly how to make the most of them. Secondly, Mrs. Agostinelli and her teachers assistants, have provided a safe environment for students to learn and more importantly reflect back on their mistakes. The culture and climate of that room is one of kindness and respect. Students are challenged to work out their problems on their own and seek help when appropriate. As a result, I have seen a tremendous amount of growth in my son's confidence. Keith is quickly learning to persevere, even when things can be challenging (both socially and academically). This is a life lesson I feel is being lost in an ever changing world of instant gratification. Lastly, the home/school communication piece is phenomenal. Mrs. Agostinelli has never been short of amazing in response to my questions. I never feel rushed by her or anyone in her class. If I email, she takes the time to write a thoughtful response back. If she has a concern, she addresses it directly. It is evident that everyone involved in this classroom is invested in educating every single kid who goes there. Overall, this program has far exceeded my wildest dreams and I cannot recommend it enough. I am so grateful to everyone that has helped my son blossom. I know now, more than ever, that he has a very bright future ahead of him. Mrs. Agostinelli and her team have set my son up for success. Thank you to Mr. Crane, Mrs. Jefferson and those at School #50 who have so profoundly impacted my child. I cannot wait to see what the next seven months have in store."

This partnership will continue in the 2017–18 school year. Five new families will have the opportunity to participate in this partnership. "Serving as the Chairperson of the Governance Board for the past 10 years, I am most proud about the fact that our suburban parents are finally beginning to realize the value of cross-district collaboration, supporting our efforts to make this program a true, two-way partnership," Jeff Crane, Superintendent of West Irondequoit Central School District.

Alumni Spotlight

Arkee Allen Irondequoit High School Class of 1994

Arkee began the Urban-Suburban Program in his freshman year at Irondequoit High School. He made the best of the opportunity as he recognized early that he wanted to lead by example in the school and promote positive stereotypes of the people who were in the program. In turn, the school gave Arkee an excellent education in more than just the core academic subject areas. Arkee participated in student government, was the treasurer of the Black Student Union, competed on the Mathlete team, and was selected for the class academic competitions.

Arkee really excelled in the athletic arena as well. He earned All-County honors in football and All State honors in wrestling. He continued wrestling into college where he was a 4 year starter, All-American, and captain of the team. Arkee credits Urban-Suburban with changing his life: "The exposure that I received from being in the program made all the difference. Before Urban-Suburban, I had dreams, but like most inner-city children, you do not know what is out there to actually want… In



the program, suddenly my goals changed, my hopes changed, and I wanted more than what I was seeking for before."

Upon graduating from Irondequoit High School, Arkee attended Columbia University on a full scholarship. He obtained a bachelor's degree in mathematics from the prestigious university. He also holds two master's degrees: one from St. John Fisher College in educational leadership and another from SUNY Brockport in mathematics.

Currently, Arkee is the Director of Community Engagement for E3 Rochester, a non-profit organization determined to bring more than 6,000 quality seats to Rochester Public Schools. In Arkee's current role, he ensures that the community is demanding quality schools within the RCSD and in the Charter Sector. Education reform has become a Civil Rights matter in Rochester, and Arkee is at the forefront of the charge to make lasting change for its residents.

Prior to this role, Arkee was the Principal of PUC Achieve Charter School in Rochester, New York. He was an Assistant Principal for five years, spending three years in a Rochester Charter School and another two in rural NY. In both places, Arkee concentrated on developing a positive culture within a school building. He began his career as a math teacher in a suburban district for eight years and left to teach in the Rochester City School District in order to inspire reluctant students to achieve.

With 19 years of experience in education under his belt, Arkee continues to aspire to make students great. He encourages those he comes into contact with to surpass their negative stereotypes and become beautiful self-reflectors. His greatest success is seen when his former students recognize that they must pay forward the blessing bestowed upon them and give back to the community once they are a success.

A veteran wrestling and lacrosse coach, Arkee is also the co-founder of ROC E6, Incorporated and We Run the Roc. ROC E6 is a summer camp and spring Lacrosse team that combines athletics and academics, teaching inner city children the necessary skills and motivation to become successful students as well as contributing members of their community. We RUN the ROC is a community group that uses Facebook to bring people together in the name of fitness and fun. Arkee believes physical fitness goes hand in hand with mental fitness and delivers this message daily to adults that want to make lifestyle changes. Through encouragement, challenges, competitions, and celebrations, the 30 member group has seen great gains and is prospering.

Arkee still resides in the city of Rochester in the same 14621 neighborhood that inspired him and raises two boys, Styles (15) and Lennon (16).

Puma Named Principal of Pittsford Sutherland High School

Pittsford, NY—Mark Puma, current assistant principal at Pittsford's Mendon Center Elementary School, has been named principal of Sutherland High School following an intensive search and interview process. Carole Schwab has been serving as Sutherland's interim principal since July 2016. He began his new role on July 1, 2017.

Puma is a longtime District employee and resides in Pittsford with his wife and three children. A native of Buffalo, Puma started his educational career in the Pittsford Central School District as a music teacher in 1998 and worked as a music teacher and department leader until being named assistant principal at Mendon Center Elementary School in 2011.



"Mark has proven himself as an outstanding leader in his administrative role at Mendon Center Elementary School," Pittsford Superintendent Michael Pero said. "I look forward to Mark using his leadership skills and experience to guide our students and staff at the secondary level and helping the District maintain its reputation of excellence both statewide and nationally. I also thank Carole Schwab for all that she has done for our students and staff at Sutherland while serving as interim principal."

As assistant principal at Mendon Center Elementary School, Puma provides clinical supervision and student behavior support while serving as an administrative representative on District committees. He currently serves as coordinator of the Dignity Act Team, chairperson of the Instructional Support Team, New York State testing coordinator and incident commander for the Incident Management Team. Puma is also a member of the District Leadership Team and Instructional Leadership Team.

"My K-12 work experience and living in this community provide me with a very unique perspective and thorough knowledge of PCSD," Puma said. "This enables me to see situations from a variety of lenses and informs my daily practice."

Puma's appointment comes a week after *U.S. News & World Report* ranked Sutherland High School No. 22 among 1,270 public high schools in New York and No. 165 nationally out of more than 20,000 public high schools. Mendon High School was ranked No. 14 statewide and No. 86 nationally. Schools are ranked based on students' performance on state-required tests and how well they prepare students for college.

Puma earned his Bachelor's Degree from SUNY Purchase with a degree in Fine Arts – Music Performance. He also earned a Master's Degree in Music from SUNY Potsdam and administrative certification from SUNY Brockport.

Puma and his wife, Lisa, have two sons and a daughter who attend Pittsford Schools.

Interview teams from the District and Sutherland High School, representing teachers, administrators, school board members, parents, and the community, conducted interviews with applicants and made their recommendation to the superintendent of schools and the Board of Education. The Board acted on that recommendation on May 2, 2017 approving Puma's appointment.
