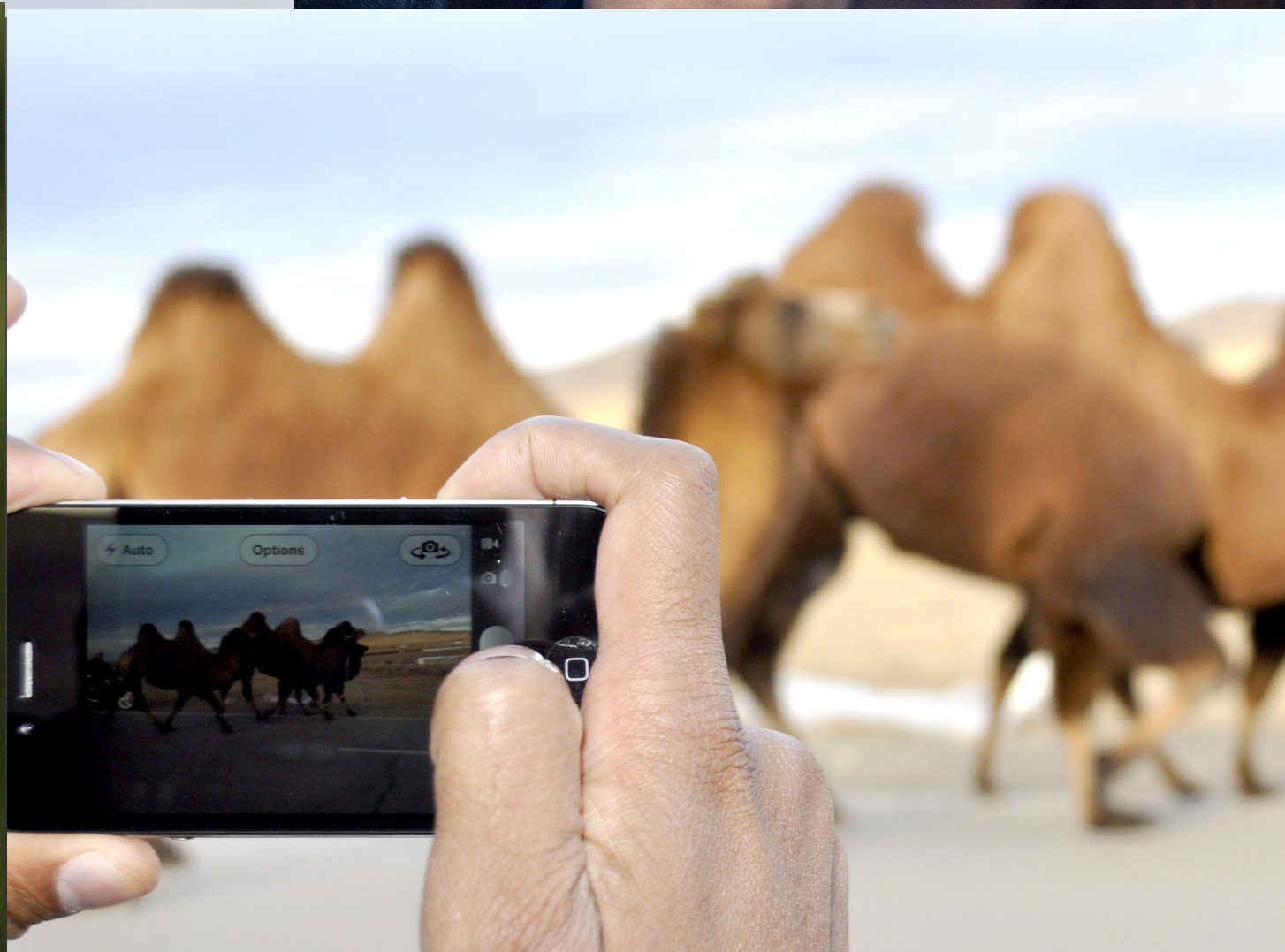

White Balance

- White balance is the process of calibrating your camera to show colors accurately under varying light conditions. Think of it as making sure the color white is always white so that your image doesn't have blue or red tints.
- How do you white balance the camera?



Light is measured in K=degrees kelvin

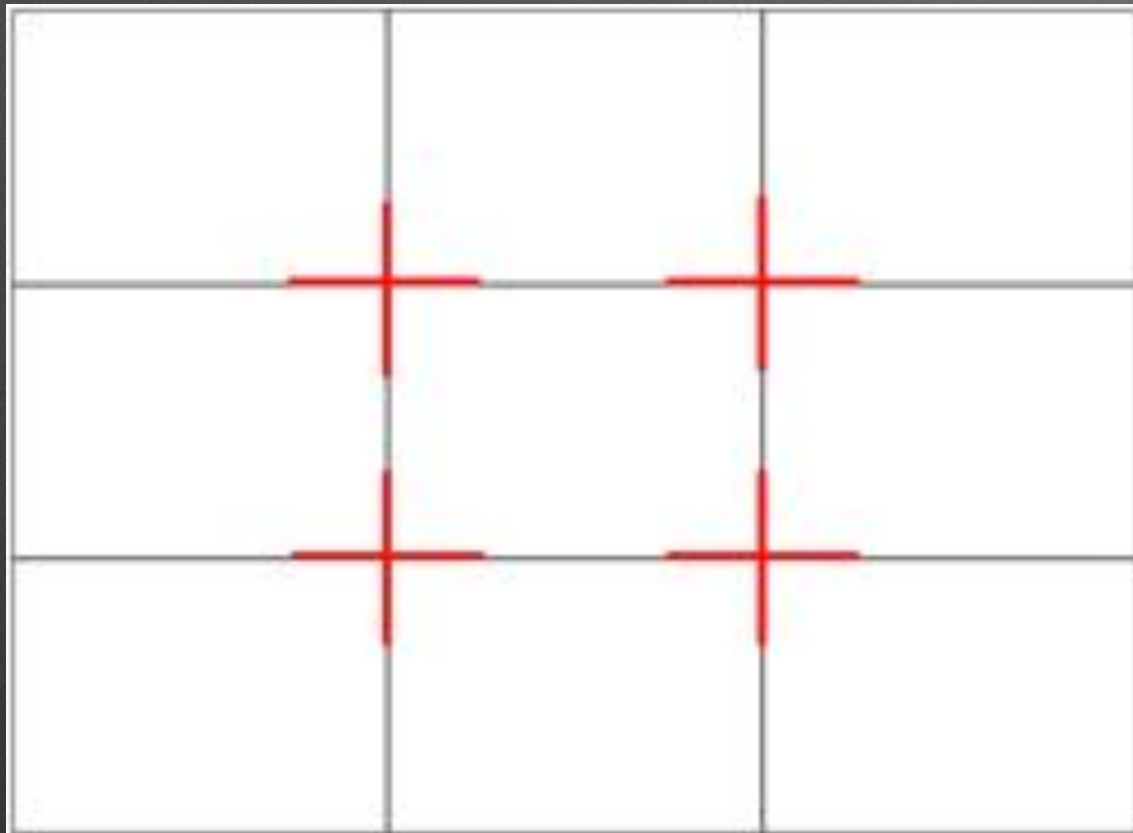

5 Reasons to Stop Zooming

- Zooms are yesterday's news (they've stopped using this method years ago).
- Zooms don't exist in the real world (unnatural)
- Zooms draw undue attention (take away from the story or content)
- Zooms can be tricky or sticky (difficult to make subtle and smooth)
- Zooms are always in home videos (overused and habitual)

When you commit to shooting your videos without zooming, you will become a far more active shooter, positioning and repositioning your camera for each shot, and you'll find that your footage immediately looks much more interesting.
